# German Language Certificate

#### Overview

The certificate demonstrates proficiency in German above the level of the German minor. It prepares studientes ripational careers, internationally recognized proficiency exams (Zertifikat Deutschreibsdsprache and Zertifikat Deutsch fur den Beruf) and internship programs in Germaspeaking countries.

There are two tracks for the German Certificate: onehian Itberal arts and one for professional purposes. In both tracks, students must earn 18 credits in German beyond GER 0002 Elementary German 2. Nine credits may be transferred from study abroad programs in Germanspeaking countries to count toward the 18tal credits.

### Requirements

The following courses apply to the certificate and should be taken in sequence as listed. Courses noted by an asterisk (\*)n \* t pass or better before taking any course in German at the 1000 level.

#### German for the Liberal Arts

GER 0003 Intermediate German 1\* GER 0004 Intermediate German 2\*\*

Two 1000 level courses in the Department of German; students may not take both GER 1001 and GER 1003

One1100-level course in the Department of German

One 1200to 1400 level course in the Department of German

## German for Professional Purposes

GER 0003 Intermediate German 1\*
GER 0004htermediate German 2\*\*
GER 1003 German for Professional Purposes 1\*
GER 1004 German for Professional Purposes 2\*\*

Two additional courses at the 1000r 1100level GER 1001, GER 1003, GER 1004, and GER 1103 do not fulfill this requirement.

#### **Grade Requirements**

A minimum GPA of 2.0 is required in each course that counts toward the certificate.

#### Satisfactory/No Credit Option

No course that counts toward the certificate can be taken on an S/NC basis unless the student received special permission from the Director of Undergraduate Studies.
